Look beyond the lectures when choosing uni courses

How to avoid choosing the 'wrong' university course

There are no 'wrong' courses. If a student decides they're not going in the direction they thought would be right for them, there are options to change things, preferably before the university census date around 4 weeks after a semester starts.

Also, some courses allow you to dabble in different subjects in the first year, before asking you to specialise for the final years.

Many people come back to uni as 'mature age' students every year and universities like ours knows how to help them adjust to it.





How to apply

Become an ECU student in 6 steps

Choose your course

Consider having a back-up course in case you've applied for a popular course, and it's oversubscribed. You can apply for up to 3 courses at once.

Check course entry requirements

Some courses have special admission 2 or 'inherent' requirements so check these too.

Check the application date Don't miss the deadline for your chosen course/s.

Apply for a scholarship

These are awarded to all kinds of people, 4 not just high achievers. You can do this when you apply for a course.

Have your paperwork ready and go online

You'll need scanned copies of other qualifications, your résumé or other required paperwork ready to upload.

Accept your offer

If you're successful, we'll send you an offer of a place. We hope you accept it and become an ECU student!

Applying is not the same as enrolling

Getting into a university course is a two-stage process.

Stage 1

They apply for one or more courses (see step 1 opposite) and if they're successful with their application, they accept the official ECU offer (an email from us with lots of information in it).

Stage 2

They enrol in their accepted course, choosing study units for the first teaching period (usually a semester). There can be competition for units, as well as for specific days and times of lectures, so they should enrol early!

This is especially important if your new uni student has part-time or casual work to fit their study around.

What campus will they attend?

These are exciting times to be an ECU student.

Our brand-new university campus - ECU City - will open to students from early 2026.

This will coincide with the closing of our Mount Lawley Campus and the move of some studies to Joondalup Campus.

Starting uni in 2025

Depending on what course they choose, the likely campus will be:

Joondalup for business, law, engineering, nursing, health sciences, general science including computing, and psychology and social sciences.

Mount Lawley for teacher education, creative arts, humanities, performing arts and production (WAAPA).

South West (Bunbury) for specific courses in business, nursing, teaching, environmental science, health science and social work.

Starting uni in 2026

While there may be variations before ECU City opens in Semester 1, we currently expect likely campuses to be:

ECU City for business, law, creative humanities, performing arts and production (WAAPA) and selected technology courses.

Joondalup for engineering, nursing, health sciences, teacher education, psychology and social sciences and some science studies.

South West (Bunbury) for specific courses in business, nursing, teaching, environmental science, health science and social work.

A university campus like no other

ECU City will redefine higher education in Western Australia.

The campus will be located in the heart of Perth, between the business, entertainment and cultural precincts, and connected by rail and bus across the city and beyond. It will activate the CBD with the energy of 10,000 students and staff and engage with the community in a way that defies traditional expectations.



Unispeak: a quick guide to some common university terms

Semesters

University courses usually run for two semesters per year, or six semesters over a typical 3-year degree with fulltime study. School leavers usually start new courses from Semester 1 in late February but have the option to start in Semester 2 in late July. Each semester runs for around 15 weeks, with a 2-week break in the middle and a 2-week exam period at the end.

Full-time vs part-time study

Students enrolled in 3 or more units in a semester are considered full-time. To complete most 3-year degrees studying full-time they need to complete 4 units per semester, i.e. 24 units over 3 years. Part-time students are enrolled in 1 or 2 units maximum per semester.

Undergraduate degrees

Undergraduates are students undertaking their first university (bachelor's) degree.

Majors and minors

A major (or unit set), is your chosen area of in-depth study in many but not all undergraduate courses. It usually involves 8 units of study, or one-third of the units in a 3-year degree. Minors include between 4 and 6 study units in a specific discipline. Not all courses require students to complete a minor.

Core units vs elective units

Core units are compulsory units that students must successfully complete as part of a course. An elective unit isn't compulsory but still counts towards a degree. Sometimes we may approve an elective unit as a replacement for a compulsory one.

Practicum placements

Many courses require students to graduate with recognised working or practical experience. They do this by completing a practicum placement in a workplace experience where they're expected to meet the same work conditions as a normal member of staff. It's a great way to add to their CV and to build networks, and it can lead to employment after they graduate.

Orientation

Orientation is a free program of activities to help students get ready to study as a new ECU student. Orientation helps them find their way around university, meet new friends and discover important course information. Orientation is the week before semester starts and is highly recommended!

HECS-HELP

This is a loan from the Australian Government, which pays university tuition fees for students enrolled in most undergraduate courses and who are either Australian or eligible New Zealand citizens, or holders of a Permanent Humanitarian Visa. The Australian Tax Office records this debt against a student's Tax File Number, and they repay the loan through the taxation system, once they're earning over a certain income.

Census date

This is one month after semesters start. It's when a student enrolment is deemed to be finalised and a charge applies to their course. This starts accumulating a HECS-HELP debt. Important to withdraw from a unit without incurring costs for that unit by the census date!

Credit and recognition of prior learning

If a student has previous formal learning, e.g. a diploma or a degree, or has prior work experience and professional development or other training while employed, they may be eligible for a credit that allows them to reduce the number of units they'll need to study for their course.

Student email account

Student email accounts are used extensively to contact students, providing updates and information about enrolment, fees, exams, semester results and important dates. It's the only email address the university will use to contact students, so it should be checked often!

Student Guild

The Student Guild is run by uni students for uni students who automatically become a member of the Guild when they enrol – and it's free. The Guild ensures that the University Administration is aware of student concerns and issues, such as protecting student rights. It also runs social and cultural events on campus and much more.

Student ID Card

An ECU student ID card acts as photo identification for students, is a print credit card for printing and photocopying and a Transperth SmartRider travel concession card (optional, for full-time students). Keep it safe!
